

Numbering down in a table

Wim Hooghwinkel had this idea:

- Place the table within a text frame. Place the text frame.
- When filling the table be aware that the procedure will exchange the sequence of columns: the leftmost will become the rightmost. Use Footer cells instead of Header cells.
- Format the table to your desire. Be aware that the alignment will be mirrored.. There must not be a table title because it will be presented top down (it can not be rotated).

Table 1: the header will become upside-down

1.	The first line in the table
2.	The second line
3.	The third line
4.	The fourth line
The number	The text

Text frame rotated by 180°. the table can not be edited (no rotated table can be rotated). Due to the rotation the two column appear exchanged (the numbered one was left).

- Select all table cells and rotate them 180°. You still can edit the contents.

- Rotate the text frame 180°. You can no more edit the table contents now.
